

## Mr. Geoffrey's Quick Guide to Research

1. Find the source: BBC News, New York Times, Journal of the American Medical Association, etc.
2. Use the source for a direct quote or indirect quote (a paraphrase).
3. Cite the source in your essay. This is called the "**In-text Citation.**"
4. List the source at the end of the essay on a separate page. This list is called the "**Works Cited**" or "**References**".

### Examples:

#### Newspaper Article from Website

In-text citation: *Blah, blah. Recently, students attacked a professor in Pakistan (Tavernise). Blah, blah.*

Works Cited: Tavernise, Sabrina. "At Top University, A Fight For Pakistan's Future." New York Times 20 April 2010, < <http://www.nytimes.com/2010/04/21/world/asia/21university.html?hp> >

#### Book with Author

In-text citation: *Blah, blah. The Mongol invasions began in the 13<sup>th</sup> century (Tompkins 561). Blah, blah.*

Works Cited: Tompkins, Jane, et. al. *World History from 10,000 BC*. New York. Oxford Press, 2003. Print.

#### Article in a magazine

In-text citation: *Blah, blah. Maliki's list was defeated in the recent election (Anderson 45). Blah, blah.*

Works Cited: Anderson, Thomas. "Leadership in Iraq". *Time Magazine*. 4 April 2010: 44-48.

#### Website, no author

In-text citation: *Blah, blah. Female literacy is a sign of a Westernized nation (BBC News). Blah, blah.*

Works Cited: BBC News "Female Literacy Increasing in Africa" *BBC News*. 13 April 2010, <[www.bbcnews.com/Africa//African.fem.literacy.html?hp](http://www.bbcnews.com/Africa//African.fem.literacy.html?hp)>

Notes: There are many more citations than those included here. These examples use MLA style. Ask your professor which system she prefers you to use.
